

## Local group fundraising to reunite Syrian family with their daughters

Talal and Fayrouz Khalaf come from Daraa in Southern Syria, where Talal taught auto mechanics at a local high school. They were forced to flee their home and war torn community and spent four years in a refugee camp in Jordan before coming to Canada last January with eight of their ten children as government sponsored refugees. Heartbreakingly, they were forced to leave behind their two adult daughters, Noor and Rabiya, together with their husbands and four young children in Jordan, who require separate sponsorship in order to be admitted to Canada as refugees. Imagine surviving the horrors of war and

the camps, only to suffer agonizing separation and constant worry about family left behind.

In Canada it's common to have an abstract idea that refugee camps are a safe refuge. But it's a harsh life in the camps, with no water and power services and little or no food. The UN is meant to provide food and supplies but they often don't make it to their destinations, leaving refugees starving and desperate. To make matters worse, in Jordan, Syrians are not legally allowed to work and earn a living in order to feed their families.

Talal and Fayrouz met Betty Cougle at the elementary school attended by their children. Betty began

organizing a group of community members from Spryfield and around the Sambro Loop to form the Khalaf Family Reunion Community Fund (KFRCF) to sponsor the daughters and their families so that the entire Khalaf family can once again be reunited. It's a huge financial undertaking, requiring \$54,000 in money and/or in-kind donations to support the families' start up costs of furniture, household items, food staples, and 12 months of income support.

The members of the group are not wealthy and the task initially seemed quite daunting. However, the youngest member of the group, Melissa Stewart, with a mixture of insight and

youthful optimism, broke down their goal and helped them realize it was within their reach. Melissa and her grandparents then went on to raise \$900 from friends attending the 80th birthday of her grandfather, Captain Bill Stewart.

The KFRCF is accepting monetary donations of any amount to help them achieve their goal. Tax receipts will be provided for donations \$10 and over. Please include your full mailing address with your donations to ensure you receive your tax receipt can be mailed to you. Cheques should be made payable to St. James United Church Sambro, and please indicate in the memo section "For Khalaf Family Reunion Community Fund" to ensure your donation is directed to the right account. Cheques can be mailed to St. James United Church at 3811 Old Sambro Road, Sambro, Nova Scotia, Canada, B3V 1G2. The group has made huge progress already and as of just before Christmas had raised about \$21,000. Many hands make light work and with help, they can reach their financial goal and submit the application by the end of January since there is a significant backlog in application processing times through Citizenship and Immigration Canada.

The Khalaf family story has touched the hearts of music legends Denis Ryan and Tony Quinn, who have scheduled a benefit concert at St. James United Church in Sambro on Sunday, January 8, 2017 at 6:30 p.m. Tickets are \$25 for adults, \$10 for youth age 13-16 and \$5 for children age 12 and under and can be purchased at [www.EventBrite.ca](http://www.EventBrite.ca) under the event name "Denis Ryan & Tony Quinn - A Concert for the Khalafs".

# Ilsley community works through work-to-rule

The month of December is usually filled with events and activities for the students of JL Ilsley High School. There are basketball, hockey and volleyball games; holiday themed noon-hour events; talent shows; coffee houses; food drives; bake sales; and a peace café. This year, however, the Nova Scotia Teachers' Union has taken a job action called "work-to-rule." After about a year without a contract, teachers across the province have begun teaching to the letter of their former contracts, which means that they do not spend their own personal time facilitating sports, clubs, extra-curricular activities and extra help sessions.

There is no question that this has been a frustrating and disappointing time for students. That said, there has been very strong support for our teachers at JL Ilsley High School. Our

school has clubs and activities that appeal to everyone. Most students understand that none of these activities happen in the absence of our teachers, and without our teachers giving up their own personal time. On any given day, evening, or weekend, Ilsley teachers are supporting their kids. Ilsley students, as a community, wanted to return that support.

On December 2nd, before work-to-rule began, the Ilsley student body staged a walk-out to draw attention to the frustrations of their teachers who were still without a contract. Unlike other student walk-outs around the province, Ilsley students made the choice to give up their own lunch hour to protest. This served two purposes; students were focused on their education and didn't want to give up class time, and they also wanted to reflect the personal time that teachers give

up to support their education. "This was a great way to give back and show support for my teachers," says grade 12 student Kiara Sexton.

Ilsley students are hopeful that the job action will not last much longer. They have a contingency plan, and say that their Christmas Week activities will take place as soon as work-to-rule is over. For a school that is usually bustling with activity, it will be a good day when things go back to normal; for students as well as for teachers. Every one in the Ilsley community hopes that day will come soon.

The storm date is Tuesday, January 10th, 6:30 p.m.

Through private sponsorships such as this, more supports can be put in place. One issue with many Syrian refugees is the language barrier, as English can be a difficult language to acquire and there are not enough supports in place.

To attain the GED, you must be at least 19 years of age, and pass a series of five tests including Language Arts Reading, Language Arts Writing, Social Studies, Math, and Science. The GED curriculum covers a lot of material and can take years to work through independently, which is where HCLN comes in. We will match you with a tutor or place you in a class where you will get the support you need to succeed.

Take Paula for example. A busy mother of two, Paula joined the GED class in Spryfield in 2015, and has never looked back. She passed all five tests and graduated with her GED and that was just the beginning. She decided to build her small business Out of the Broom Closet into something bigger. Paula designs and makes clothing and jewelry. With the support of volunteers, funding from the Nova Scotia Department of Labour and Advanced Education and partners such as Halifax Public Libraries, Captain William Spry Community Centre and Chebucto Connections (to name but a few) HCLN has

helped hundreds of adults work toward their goals and find their way to brighter futures.

## Business owner in Spryfield? You need to read this!

With over 30,000 residents and more than 300 local businesses located from the Armdale Roundabout to Sambro and around the entire "Loop", we are larger than most towns in Nova Scotia. With that in mind, a new local initiative, Sprynet Business Solutions, has formed to bring those businesses together and to enlighten the community as to just what is in our own backyard. The program is being spearheaded by Maria Caines and Fred O'Hearn, both local entrepreneurs and long time local business people. Because Fred and I volunteer, membership rates are kept to a minimum, as low as \$25 (for a single business person) to a high of \$250 for a large corporation or a business outside of the "Loop" community. Staples Office Supplies have joined at that rate, as an example. Most businesses

fall in the \$100 range, and the rates are based upon the number of employees." All businesses in the "Loop" are welcome.

Sprynet's focus is on "Growing our Community" and the businesses in it. "If our community grows, we all grow." was Art MacMillan's sentiment at one of the founding meetings. Beyond the Spryfield core, Sprynet will reach well into the communities around the Sambro Loop and will include Purcell's Cove and even St. Margaret's Bay Road. Basically, everything this side of the rotary, off the peninsula, according to O'Hearn, a long time owner of Lumbermart, now being run by his son Jason. Events planned for 2017 by this very proactive group include the launch of their website [www.sprynet.biz](http://www.sprynet.biz) on Jan. 5th, to coincide with their first meeting of 2017 (see below), with lots of networking with fellow business people from the area. You don't have to be a member to participate but you do have to reserve your space as it is limited. ## DISCOVERING OUR PAST



### Family histories can create challenges and surprises

Researching family histories can be a challenge but can often lead to documents containing some amazing discoveries. When attempting to compile the family history of Alice, Grace and Sidney Drysdale of Brookside, near Hatchet Lake, Nova Scotia, I discovered a few surprises. Their parents, Andrew Drysdale and Hannah Boutilier, both died in 1872 when the three children were aged four, three and two years. Hannah, their mother, died March 18th of inflammation, three weeks following the birth of her fourth child, William Charles. Andrew, their father, died December 25th of heart disease, one day after his 11 month old son, William Charles, died of measles.

In a Supreme Court record, dated April 8, 1873, a petition was registered in the names of Alice, Grace and Sidney Drysdale. The record stated that the three children were entitled to their father's estate which consisted of a small house and barn on a property in Brookside, worth at least \$400. The children were in the care of their father's sister, Elizabeth, wife of Daniel George of Halifax. The uncle of the three young children, Charles Drysdale of Brookside, asked to be appointed Guardian to the three children. Permission was granted.

The Supreme Court documents revealed that Charles Drysdale sold the property on May 10, 1873 for \$410. A "loan of mortgage" was made to the buyer, William J. Flemming, in the amount of \$220 which would provide a monthly income for the children. The remaining amount of money from the sale was absorbed by expense claims.

A second document, dated 1874, was found in the Registry of Deeds at the Nova Scotia Archives and would give two of the children, six year old Alice and four year old Sidney, a permanent home with the Sutherland family of Spryfield. Their guardian, Charles Drysdale, drew up a legal agreement with Mary Ann Sutherland, mother of school teacher Elizabeth Sutherland, in which she would provide a home and education for six year old Alice. Alice, in return, was expected to help Mrs. Sutherland with household chores and gardening. Four year old Sidney Drysdale was adopted by Elizabeth Sutherland's brother, George, and his wife, Rebecca Umlah, who were childless. The document did not mention what be-

came of their sister, five year old Grace Drysdale.

The descendants of Sidney Drysdale had heard stories about Grace which were passed down by generations of family members. One of those stories was that Grace had been adopted by the Romans. Thinking they were referring to a family named Romans, I searched for a likely family with that surname and hit a dead end. I recalled, however, years ago, people used the word "Romans" when referring to members of the Roman Catholic faith. That happened to be the case with the Presbyterian Drysdale family. One more family story about Grace was that she had joined the Sisters of Charity. Sidney Drysdale's great granddaughter, Betty Sanderson, contacted Mount Saint

Vincent Mother House where they were able to provide Grace's story.

Grace had been adopted by Michael and Eleanor Fahie of Halifax. When Grace entered the Sisters of Charity on February 2, 1890, she was 21 years old and was listed as Grace Fahie. She became known as Sister Mary Cornelius. Grace died October 1, 1913 at the age of 44 years. She worked at St. Joseph's Orphanage in Halifax but suffered from epilepsy for 10 years prior to her death. Heart failure and epilepsy were listed on her death certificate as "cause of death". Her surname on the death certificate was Drysdale. She was buried in Mount Olivet Cemetery.

Alice Melinda and Sidney Reuben Drysdale led very productive lives as members of the Sutherland families.

Both children kept the Drysdale surname although the Sutherland name was often used by them and by others. They attended school in Spryfield and were brought up in the Church of England, the religion of the Sutherland family. A Christmas gift in 1883 from Sidney to Alice was an Autograph Book addressed to Alice Melinda D. Sutherland. In George Sutherland's will, dated February 9, 1889, both Alice and Sidney were mentioned... "to Alice M. Sutherland, adopted daughter of my wife, Mary Ann, six shares of Cotton Stock; I give and bequeath to Sidney R. Sutherland, adopted son of George Walter Sutherland, three shares of Cotton Stock."

Alice married Archibald Kidston, Jr. in 1891 and moved to Harrietsfield where she and her husband established their own farm, separate from the original Kidston farm on Rockingstone Road in Spryfield. Alice and Archibald Kidston raised a family of seven children, three of whom were named after Alice's sister and two brothers, Grace, Sidney and William Charles. Their descendants continue to live in the area. If you drive along the Old Sambro Road to Harrietsfield, you will see, on your right, remnants of the old Kidston Farm...the deteriorating stonewall beside the road and apple trees in the overgrown field. Two of Alice's sons, Richard (Dick) and Sid Kidston, married Drysdale sisters who grew up at Long Pond on the Herring Cove Road. When Sid Kidston's first wife, Mary Drysdale, died, he married her sister, Laura. Dick Kidston married another sister, Florence Drysdale. Alice Melinda Drysdale Kidston died January 15, 1937 and is buried in Emmanuel Cemetery in Spryfield.

Alice's brother, Sidney Reuben Drysdale, married Elizabeth (Bessie) Drysdale from Greenhead, near Goodwood. Both of Bessie's parents were Drysdales. Sidney and Bessie lived in Halifax where Sidney was a Chauffeur. They had one daughter, Nellie Whitman, who named her son Sidney. Sidney Reuben Drysdale died January 18, 1941 and is buried in Camp Hill Cemetery.

The photograph of Sidney and Alice Drysdale was among the Sutherland family pictures and donated to Mainland South Heritage Society by Shirley Goulden, a Sutherland/Yeadon descendant.







# Groups honoured for Adopt-A-Highway cleanups

Two local youth groups were recently honoured as Outstanding Youth Groups at a volunteer luncheon in Truro celebrating the 20th Anniversary of Divert NS (formerly known as RRFB Nova Scotia).

The Gospel Light Baptist Church Youth Group and the Spryfield Boy Scouts Troop were both recognized for their diligent work with the Adopt-A-Highway program. These groups have been helping keep their pocket of Nova Scotia beautiful for 10 years and have removed over 1,600 bags of litter and miscellaneous other items.

The Spryfield Boy Scouts care for the stretch of Old Sambro Road (Highway 306) from the corner of Sussex Drive to Fish Brook Bridge, while the Gospel Light Youth Group takes care of the area between Whitehead Road and Moody Park Drive. Although they each have just a 3 kilometre route, they routinely collect about 100 bags of litter, which is one full bag every 30 metres or 100 feet.

The Scouts have done a cleanup every spring since joining the Adopt-A-Highway program in 2007, and the Gospel Light Youth have done one every Spring and Fall. These youth are an inspiration to us all, to help keep our communities beautiful and pristine.

## Stormwater Service: Past, Present and Future



**The Past** Stormwater fees, distinct from taxation, have existed since 1997. A wastewater/stormwater management charge was initially levied by HRM in 1997 and collected on the water bill by Halifax Water for HRM. At that time, only customers with piped wastewater service received a bill. Residents serviced by ditches and culverts did not pay, but were still provided the service by HRM through funds collected from customers with piped wastewater service. In other words, customers with piped service were subsidizing customers served by ditches and culverts.

**The Present** In 2007 Halifax Water assumed responsibility for wastewater and stormwater service delivery and reviewed these charges based on user pay principles, as regulated by the Nova Scotia Utility and Review Board (NSUARB). In July 2013 the NSUARB approved the current rate structure which corrected the inequity noted above.

**The Future** On October 31, 2016 Halifax Water filed a Stormwater rate application with the NSUARB. The NSUARB hearing, which is open to the public, is scheduled to commence on February 14, 2017.

Highlights of the proposed changes to how Halifax Water charges for stormwater service include:

- Tiering of Residential Properties. Properties with more impervious area would pay more than those with less impervious area. Under this proposal, the majority of residential customers (88%) will see a decrease in their Site Related Flow [SRF] Charge from Halifax Water, as noted in the table below.

- More properties will be exempt from the SRF charge – those with less than 50 square meters of impervious area.
- Customers will be billed in increments of 10 m<sup>2</sup> rather than billing based on 1 m<sup>2</sup> of impervious area.
- Introduce a credit system for non-residential properties with best management practices such as retention ponds that help manage peak stormwater flows.

In an effort to better explain stormwater service, Halifax Water has significantly improved its website, with graphics, videos and a searchable Stormwater Service Boundary map. The enhanced website provides information that is much easier to understand and navigate. The power of sport is staggering. Sport infuses our culture to the point where a significant portion of our identity as Canadians is rooted in our love of sports; in particular hockey. In the States it is baseball and football. Around the world soccer (football to most of the planet) is the dominant sport. And every single culture and region of the world has their own version of a sporting activity.

Sport is both business and recreation. Competitive sport is enjoyed locally, as House and Rec leagues; regionally; nationally and internationally. There are TV and radio channels and of course multitudes of websites devoted to sports. Some sports even own a channel devoted to just that sport!

Every study ever done shows the benefits of sports on children and adults alike. Better health and future health choices, better academic results, better interpersonal relationships as kids and throughout life, improved goal setting, higher degrees of confidence and elevated levels of overall achievement come from early and sustained involvement in sport activities.

One way or another, we have all been touched by sport. Whether as participants ourselves, parents of kids in sport, or just as observers of an Olympic Gold Medal Canada vs US hockey game; sport has been a part of our lives.

Yet sport activity has a deeper meaning than the ones I've observed here. It can develop a community, welcome strangers and build relationships. Sport has the power to transform someone into a strong, confident, goal oriented achiever. Sport ignores cultural and language differences and brings all who participate onto common ground where victory is celebrated together and the bitterness of defeat is shared by all. Sportsmanship defies our differences and elevates us to a place where respect and courtesy are the norm and one's opponent is recognized for their effort; win or lose.

A year ago the government of Canada began the process of allowing thousands of refugees into Canada from some of the most dangerous places on earth. These newcomers came to this country seeking safety and a future for themselves and their children. The stories of hardship and unimaginable fear that predated their arrival are only now being told.

In the Spring of 2016, Chimo Taekwondo offered to sponsor as many of these amazing people as wished to be a part of our family and begin their martial arts practise. The motivation was not so much to teach martial arts, although that is how we reach our goals, but rather to allow the com-

mon language of sport to be a conduit for the newcomer community to feel more at home and welcomed.

On the first night we saw 5 nervous children and their parents come into the dojang obviously unsure about what to expect. The next night we saw 3 more join us. By the end of the second week we had welcomed 30 children into the club and at last count we are over 50 newcomer members aged 4-17.

With no common language, our newcomer students have learned new

skills, made new friends and broken down the barriers that exist between cultures that too often choose to misunderstand one another. Our original students have found themselves face to face with children from completely unknown backgrounds and have flourished as leaders. The entire Chimo family welcomed the newcomer families and have created a new and vibrant community within the club, all thanks to the common language that is sport.

I have participated in, and coached,

various sports ranging from local to international competition for 45 years. In that time I have experienced many, many moments of personal achievement and pride in my athletes. The transformation of all our club members over the past 6 months stands out as perhaps the most significant example of the positive impact that sport can have on people, of all ages, all backgrounds and all cultures.

Sport has become our common language and with it, the power to change the world.

# Councillor confident that snow and ice control for the rest of the winter will improve significantly

As a result of the less than acceptable performance of snow removal in Spryfield during the last few storms, I requested a meeting with our staff and our contractors to put forward concerns raised regarding missed streets, missed subdivisions, impassable roads, and extensive ice throughout our community. The streets brought to my attention include, but are not limited to, Green Acres, Mansion Ave, Woodcrest, Pine Grove, Governor's Brook, Barclay, Parkmoor and sections of the Herring Cove Road. During snow storms I also drove throughout our District so that I could see first-hand the issues we face and report them as well. During our meeting with staff we also discussed concerns raised regarding resident interactions with 311 and these were addressed by staff.

Last year I had a meeting similar to the one held in December resulting in outstanding snow removal and ice control performance (only 2 complaints in 3 storms). I am confident that snow and ice control for the rest of the winter will improve significantly.

As I am sure you can imagine, plows can be difficult to manoeuvre, especially on some of our narrow

streets. In order to help allow plow drivers to remove the snow, I would ask that cars be parked off the street to allow the trucks to get through. This will help immensely in the snow-clearing efforts.

Given the vast area of District 11, there are various employees who plow the streets. There could be municipal or provincial employees or contracted employees all working to keep our roads clear. This does pose challenges when there are problems with snow removal. If you live in Spryfield, call 3-1-1 and request a reference number for your call. If you live in or around

the Sambro Loop, call 902-450-5281. If the results of these calls prove unsatisfactory, please call or email me with the reference number of your initial complaint.

Some residents have used social media to try to get streets plowed. Although this method may raise awareness to others, it is not as effective as the options I have previously described.

In a past article, you may have read some information regarding a proposed development at 383 Herring Cove Road; perhaps better known as the former Shell Station across from

Central Spryfield School. This proposal is for a seven story building, with 5 residential floors and 2 floors of commercial space. There will be a public information meeting to address any concerns you may have or to answer any questions about the project. Our staff and the applicants will be in attendance. The meeting will be held at the Captain William Spry Centre on January 12, 2017 at 7:00 p.m. – I hope to see you there.

## How to ensure you are bringing home a healthy dog or cat

Bringing a furry new addition into your household is a great time for your family; your adorable new pet will bring great joy to both you and your children. All animals are lovable, so it's expected that you will spend significant time fawning over different breeds. However, you have to be careful that when selecting a dog or cat, you look out for warning signs that indicate ill health or susceptibility to disease. This is not an easy task! So in order to help you make the best decision, we've put together some of the tell-tale signs for choosing an active, healthy pet:

### 1) Eyes

When selecting a healthy dog or cat, you want to make sure that your new pet's eyes are bright and clear. Look out for any discharge collecting in the corners, as this can indicate susceptibility to conjunctivitis. A healthy dog or cat will have alert looking eyes, so if your potential pet looks tired or lethargic then take note, as this can lead to extensive veterinary trips early on.

### 2) Nose

Everyone knows that a healthy dog has a wagging tail and a moist nose, and this is no different when selecting newborns. Have a feel of the tip, is it rough and dry? Does it have any colored discharge? These are warning signs that your newborn pet isn't in full health, so be sure to make note. Also, watch out for any significant sneezing. A sneezing kitten can be adorable, but if it is extensive then it can also indicate allergies or respiratory infection.

### 3) Ears

For puppies and kittens, their ears should stand as per their breed. For instance, a Chihuahua puppy should be sharp and pinning vertically upwards,

whereas a Labrador usually has a set of floppy ears. Have a closer look and make sure that no wax or odour occurs; they should have a distinctive sweet smell. Make sure that there are no signs of ear mites lurking in and around the ears. They will appear as dark, grainy debris similar in appearance to coffee grounds and require a veterinary medication to resolve them.

### 4) Teeth and Gums

It is also worth checking your puppy or kitten's bite. The correct bite should have the upper incisors slightly overlapping the lower ones. It's also OK if the incisors meet edge to edge, however if the bottom set overlap the top then you may have to see a veterinarian about this. Their gums should be pink and healthy; pale or discolored gums suggest possible susceptibility to disease. By 8-12 weeks, your puppy or kitten should be eating solid food without any significant trouble.

### 5) General Health

There are some general signs to look out for when selecting a healthy dog or cat. Your new furry friend should be active and looking to explore at an early age. Most puppies or kittens are purchased at 8-12 weeks of age, so by this stage they should be able to walk fairly stable and remain active. Obviously, they will want to sleep a fair amount as would any baby, however if they are overall generally lethargic and exhausted then this is cause for concern.

Hold your pet in your hands and run your fingers through its coat. Make sure to get right down to the skin, which should be pale or pink. If there are any signs of redness or discoloration then you should have this looked over by a vet. Also, check for a regular heartbeat that doesn't seem out of sync.




