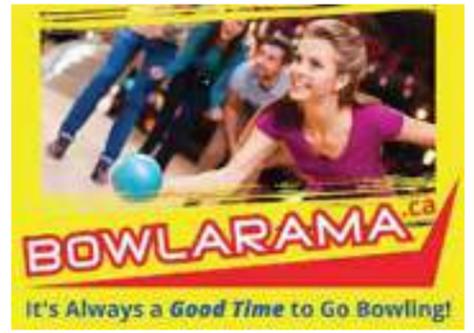
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
Ilsley students participate in the McIntosh Run Cleanup

Kitten proofing the house

The majority of cat adoptions in the world tend to see people bringing kittens home as their new pet. Of course, because kittens are babies, you will have to take measures to kitten proof your house. This will not only keep your belongings safe but will ensure the safety of your new pet. Kittens are naturally curious, which means you should prepare for your kitten proofing even prior to your cat adoption.

Move plants: The first step you can take toward kitten proofing your home is to explore the plants you have growing indoors. Certain types are poisonous to cats, which means your kitten can get seriously ill if it ingests leaves, flowers or anything else. Remove these plants from the house and place them outdoors in your garden or garage. If this is not possible, consider housing them in hanging baskets in your home. This will effectively keep them out of your new pet's reach.

Secure screens: If there are any windows in your home that do not have screens, put some up immediately.

This should be done prior to any cat adoptions. Kittens and cats alike love to sit in window wills to peer outside, and screens will help to protect them from falling out and getting lost.

Remove plastic bags: Remove any stray plastic bags from the floor or anywhere else that your kitten can get into. Kittens tend to love playing with whatever they can get their little paws on, but plastic bags can be deadly if your pet gets trapped inside. Put all bags away where your kitten can't get to them or recycle them.

Store household cleaners: Put away any substances that are harmful to your kitten's health. This includes household cleaners, mothballs, paint, paint thinner, and other items that pets can get into. Before your cat adoptions, you should make sure these items are stored safely away in closets, crawlspaces or cabinets where your pet will not have access to them.

Kitchen caution: Always supervise your pet kitten when you are cooking and using the stove or oven. If your pet is the type who likes to climb up on kitchen cabinets, the sink and the



stove, it is best to keep him or her out of the kitchen, especially when you are cooking or cleaning as this can be a dangerous situation.

Keep kittens indoors: Keep your kitten indoors at all times. Cats tend to be far more healthy and safe when you raise them to be house cats. When you let them roam outside, especially as kittens, they can more easily contract diseases or become injured and even killed in the worst case scenario.

Tie up cords: Pick up any dangling cords or strings that may attract your kitten. Kittens can get strangled if they get caught up in these things.

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DISCOVERING OUR PAST

A letter written in 1947 by a teacher from Old Cunard School in Jollimore

Old Cunard School in Jollimore burned down in January 1947, just before the students were to return to classes following their Christmas break. The letter below was sent to the editor of the Evening Mail, a Halifax newspaper. The letter, dated January 1947, was written by a former teacher at Old Cunard School in Jollimore. Her name was Kathryn (Martin) Hodgson. Her address at the time was Outremont, Quebec. Miss Kathryn Martin taught at the school for seven years during the 1920s.

Letter:

I was so saddened by the radio broadcast that the school in Jollimore had been destroyed by fire. Since the passing of my old friends Mr. and Mrs. MacIlreith, with whom I stayed, I have had little news of Jollimore. However, I feel that I would like to express my sympathy with the community in their loss.

The Christmas season never fails to bring back memories of the Christmas closing of Cunard School. The Christmas tree, the programs presented by earnest pupils, and Mr. MacIlreith arriving, laden with prizes for about every pupil, so it seemed.

I like to remember the many little cherubs I taught there. When I look back, I think they were all very lovely children and even those I thought naughty then have become little angels in my memory. As I have added years I know they have too (many are now married and have children of their own), but I like to think of them as they were then.

I can recall Thelma and Marjorie Hunter looking like pictures from storybooks, and Myrna Hunter and Merle Hennesey of exceptional brilliance—all with perfect deportment; the MacIlreith boys, the little Jollimore boys, so close to me because I was so much a part of their daily lives—Fred and Foster Boutilier and Dick Innes, the Powell boys, the Jus-sup children; Clarence and Evelyn Slaunwhite, Hazel Topple and so many others.

I can never forget the highlight that marked the climax of my seven years spent with these children and the very kind parents. I like to recall the kindness that prompted the tribute paid to me at my journey's end in the

teaching profession. I still remember the efforts of the late Chesley Milton to help make this a success.

I wish I were blessed with enough of this world's goods to help rebuild your school but can only send my very deep regards to the loss and sincerely hope that understanding and wise judgment will be exercised in building the new school. So, in closing may I wish you and all former pupils who remember me, God's blessing.

In 1926 Kathryn Martin was one of the teachers at the school and the following marks for the Jollimore Village School Exams were posted in the Evening Mail for the Christmas exams written by the junior students. The names of some of the same students were mentioned in her 1947 letter.

Grade 3: Marjorie Hunter, 84; Herbert Powell, 77; Frank Romans, 76; Foster Boutilier, 61.

Grade 2B: Parker Beaver, 89; Willie Slaunwhite, 85; Laura McDermott, 85; Thelma Hunter, 79; Hazel White, 76; Annie Baigent, 76; Violet Topple, 67.

Grade 2A: Lucy Jollimore, 75; Florence Northup, 74; Arthur Powell, 56; Roy Slaunwhite, 53; Jimmie Innes, 50.

Grade 1: Leo Jollimore, 76; John Barry, 64; Francis Melvin, 60.

Primary: Evelyn Slaunwhite, 76; Reggie Slaunwhite, 72; Earle Slaunwhite, 84; Wilhemina Jacobson, 57.

Beginners: names in order of merit, Freddie Bignell, Edith Topple,

Mary Slaunwhite, Eleanor Powell, Roy Jollimore, Albert Innes, Herbert Lane, Beatrice Slaunwhite, Jimmie Slaunwhite.

Old Cunard School was not rebuilt and a playground is now located on the former schoolground at the corner of Kirk and Albion Roads. You may still be able to see the remnants of the school foundation at the back of the lot.

The students were sent elsewhere to complete their grades that year. There were offers of temporary accommodation from Mrs. John Cruikshank and from the Dingle Canteen for some of the 165 pupils. The trust-

ees decided to act on an offer to use St. James Church hall and the Kiwanis building at the head of the North West Arm for Grades Five to Eight. Thanks to the generosity of Father P.F. Martin of St. John the Baptist Church in Melville Cove, Grades One to Four were accommodated at Melvilla Hall, an old munitions building and former Roman Catholic Mission located behind the church. Grades nine to twelve had been attending LeMarchant Street School and Queen Elizabeth High School. Parents of some Grade Eight students decided to send their children to city schools rather than have them in half-day classes at St. James Church Hall. Gladys Redmond was principal of Old Cunard School at the time of the fire. Eight students remained in Mrs. Redmond's Grade Eight class and it was reported by Mrs. Redmond that all of them passed their entrance exam to the city schools that June.

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Friends of McNabs Island Society-McNabs Island Beach Cleanup hauls in dozens of lobster traps, old bottles, an old deep freezer, a toilet and an assortment of plastic toys

On June 4, 200 volunteers travelled to McNabs Island in Halifax Harbour for the annual cleanup of the Provincial Park and Fort McNab National Historic Site. Volunteers took part in Oceans Week and Environment Week activities cleaning up the shoreline of the park that gets littered with garbage every year.

In total, volunteers collected 500 bags of garbage and recyclables. Since 1991, volunteers have collected

nearly 13,000 bags of garbage and recyclables from the beaches of this green jewel in Halifax Harbour.

Severe winter storms brought more than 30 lobster traps up on the beaches of the island. Marine debris included fibreglass boat parts, part of a kayak, several paddles and fishing gear. Divers from the Seawolves Scuba Club hauled up old broken bottles from the waters near Maugers Beach, including a 50-year old intact Sussex



Ginger Beer bottle, and then pulled up a toilet from under Garrison Pier!

Other unusual items included a toy rocking horse, a tiny plastic rhinoceros, a cross-country ski and a mini Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtle. Clothing items found included Ville de Quebec ball cap and a high heeled shoe.

The bulk of the items found were plastics—plastic sheeting and containers, and pieces of Styrofoam. Plastic tampon applicators and Tim Horton’s coffee cups continue to litter the beaches.

Youth groups including 2nd Colby Pathfinders and Ecole Secondaire du Sommet participated, as well as staff from McInnes Cooper, CBCL and Bend Beauty Skin Care.

The McNabs and Lawlor Islands

Provincial Park cleanup is the longest running and largest cleanup in the Maritimes. Thanks to all the volunteers who cleaned up the beaches and to McInnesCooper, Waterfront Development and the Halifax Dump and Run for supporting the volunteers; Clean Nova Scotia for providing garbage bags; Source Atlantic for providing gloves; Murphy’s Cable Wharf and A & M Sea Charters for transporting volunteers; Nova Scotia Department of Natural Resources staff for getting the garbage to the main wharf and A&M Sea Charters and Waterfront Development for hauling the garbage back to Eastern Passage where it was picked up by city garbage trucks for final disposal and recycling.

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


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

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Stormwater Service: Past, Present and Future



The Past Stormwater fees, distinct from taxation, have existed since 1997. A wastewater/stormwater management charge was initially levied by the municipality in 1997 and collected on the water bill by Halifax Water for the municipality. At that time, only customers with piped wastewater service received a bill. Residents serviced by ditches and culverts did not pay, but were still provided the service by the municipality through funds collected from customers with piped wastewater service. In other words, customers with piped service were subsidizing customers served by ditches and culverts.

The Present In 2007 Halifax Water assumed responsibility for wastewater and stormwater service delivery and reviewed these charges based on user pay principles, as regulated by the Nova Scotia Utility and Review Board (NSUARB). In July 2013 the NSUARB approved the current rate structure which corrected the inequity noted above.

The Future On April 12, 2017 the NSUARB approved the number of stormwater rate changes, including those listed below. The changes will take effect on July 1, 2017.

Highlights of the changes to how Halifax Water charges for stormwater service include:

- Tiering of Residential Properties. Properties with more impervious area (concrete/asphalt, driveway, roofs, etc.) will pay more than those with less impervious area. With these approved changes, the majority of residential customers (88%) will see a decrease in their Site Related Flow [SRF] Charge from Halifax Water, as noted in the table below.

- More properties are exempt from the SRF charge – those with less than 50 square meters of impervious area.
- Customers to be billed in increments of 10 m² rather than billing based on 1 m² of impervious area.

In an effort to better explain stormwater service, Halifax Water has significantly improved its website, with graphics, videos and a searchable Stormwater Service Boundary map. The enhanced website provides information that is much easier to understand and navigate.



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Crosswalks are not suitable for all community roadways

Over the past few months, I have received a number of requests for crosswalks throughout our community. I ensure that each request is forwarded to our Traffic Engineers for consideration and assessment. The most recent requests include, but are not limited to, Rockingstone Road at Elizabeth Sutherland School, Old Sambro Road at Schnare Street, and Herring Cove Road across from the William Spry Centre.

Because of the numerous requests for the marking of crosswalks, it has been necessary to establish criteria which provide an objective basis for evaluation as to where marked crosswalks are installed on HRM roadways. Most jurisdictions in Canada use some form of evaluation criteria to determine which crosswalks will be marked and which will not. The HRM Traffic Authority has adopted the nationally recognized Transportation Association of Canada (TAC) warrants for marked crosswalk installations. The TAC Pedestrian Crossing Control Guide was developed to promote uniformity across the country for pedestrian crossings. This assessment looks at a number of criteria for a given location, including traffic volumes and pedestrian volumes, as well as a number of safety considerations.

The pedestrian volume warrant requires an average of 15 pedestrians per hour for 7 consecutive hours. This is a total of 105 pedestrians for a 7 hour period.

It must be emphasized that crosswalks are not installed as a form of traffic calming, or to address issues around excessive vehicle speeds on a roadway. Although traffic control devices can help to promote an exchange of information between pedestrians and drivers, there is no inherent safety provided by marked crosswalks as line painting and signage do not physically protect a pedestrian. Pedestrians can be given a false sense of security with marked crosswalks and use less caution when crossing within them. At locations where pedestrian use is sporadic drivers may be less vigilant; this combination would create a hazardous situation for those wishing to cross within the marked crosswalk.

The following is a verbatim response from my request for a crosswalk across from Captain William Spry:

“A marked crosswalk at this location has been requested in the past, and as a result a review has already been completed, with additional data collected this past spring.

The section of Herring Cove Road in front of the William Spry Centre consists of four travel lanes, a bus bay, and left turn lane. It would not be appropriate to install a marked crosswalk here due to the complexity of the right-of-way.”

Currently there is a marked crosswalk with push-button activated flashers (Ra-5) nearby, across Herring Cove Road at Sussex Street. Ra-5

installation is a requirement due to the multi-lane nature of the roadway and high traffic volumes. Placing marked crosswalks in close proximity is not recommended by Transportation Association of Canada guidelines as driver compliance has been shown to decrease in these instances, which creates safety concerns for pedestrians. Due to its proximity, installation of a new marked Ra-5 crosswalk closer to the William Spry Centre walkway (such as at the intersection with Aldergrove) would likely be a relocation of this existing crosswalk at Sussex. Pedestrian data collected in April of this year indicates that the Sussex location

is heavily used and therefore would not be relocated.

Last month, construction started on the sewer and water upgrades in Leiblen Park, and the reconstruction of the sidewalk from Kenwood Avenue to Rockingstone Road. In addition to a new sidewalk, new concrete curbs will be installed at all bus stops.

There have been a couple of situations where the project contractor had to temporarily turn off water service to a number of homes. Although every attempt was made to give notice, some residents were unaware. There are no further water shutdowns antici-

pated for the duration of this project.

The next round of work will necessitate blasting. For homeowners in a certain radius of the blasting, a pre-blast survey will be completed, to obtain a baseline after the work is done. A comparison is then done after completion, to assess damage, if any. By-law B-600 is the Blasting by-law. New approaches: an update from Ottawa

June was an incredibly busy month in Ottawa; we were burning the midnight oil as Parliament sat late into the night, often to midnight. Many exciting new policies were announced, and today, I want to talk about two of these great initiatives that will have impacts right here in our own community.

A new approach to child care

In Budget 2017, our government committed \$7.5 billion towards affordable and accessible childcare. What does this historic investment mean in the lives of Canadian families? It's estimated that this funding will create 40,000 new childcare spaces.

This June, our government started to put this investment into action through the new Multilateral Early Learning and Child Care Framework. This funding will be implemented in partnership with the provinces and territories. Our partnership is grounded in shared goals around childcare: increase the quality; improve accessibility; enhance affordability; create more flexibility so that provinces and territories can address their specific needs; and promote inclusivity, particularly for Indigenous children. On this last point, we are also working with Indigenous partners to develop a separate Indigenous Early Learning Child Care Framework that reflects the unique cultural needs of First Nations, Inuit and Métis communities.

Why do we need this investment in child care? I was shocked to learn that only one in four children in Canada has access to regulated child care. Considering that early learning and development has long-term effects on our children's health, it is time for this to change. What's more, the burden of child care falls disproportionately on women. This is not only an investment in child care. This is also an investment in healthy families and communities.

A new approach to defence

One of the most amazing things about Canada is that it offers a safe place to grow up, live, and work. It is important that we ensure it remains a safe place. That's why I want to talk to

you about Canada's New Defence Policy, which Minister Harjit Sajjan announced this June.

Halifax knows the important role of our military; we see it right here in our home community. In our riding alone, we are home to 1,061 regular force members, 304 reserve force members, and 424 civilian personnel, who all embody our armed forces' dedication to protecting our country. On top of this, many of the ships in Canada's navy start right here in Halifax.

As we are home to Canada's Atlantic fleet, I welcome all the good news in Canada's New Defence Policy. I especially want to highlight four important areas of investment in this policy.

First, we are investing in capabilities and equipment. We're increasing spending by more than 70%, raising annual cash defence spending from \$18.9 billion this year to \$32.7 billion in 2026/27. For Halifax, one of the most significant commitments is to build 15 new surface combatants for the Royal Canadian Navy. Canada will also be building between 5-6 Arctic offshore patrol ships – ice-capable ships, and replacing the CF-18 fleet with 88 advanced fighter aircraft.

Second, we are investing in our

people. We're going to grow the Regular force by 3,500 members and the reserve force by 1,500. As part of this strategy, we're committed to boosting the proportion of women in the forces to 25% by 2026. These dedicated members of our armed forces are the backbone of Canadian security, and they deserve our support. That's why I'm happy to see the amazing investment of \$198.2 million in a new Total Health and Wellness Strategy and \$6 million per year to modernize family support programs, such as Military Family Resource Centres. On top of this, all troops deployed on international operations will be exempt from federal income tax on their salary up to the pay level of Lieutenant-Colonel. These measures recognize the incredible contribution that the armed forces make to our country.

Third, we are investing in innovation. Our academics, universities, think tanks, and experts are critical partners in the face of evolving defence needs. We want to tap into this resource with an investment of \$1.6 billion resources in an "Innovation for Defence Excellence and Security" (IDEaS) initiative.

Fourth, we are investing in partnerships and in our sovereignty. Canada
