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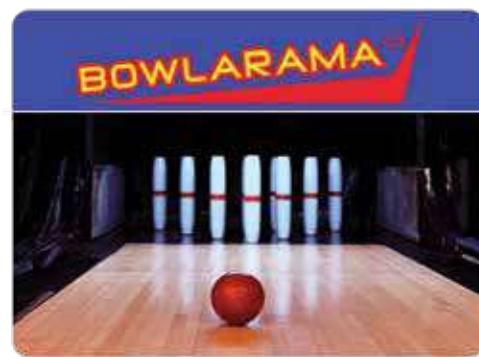

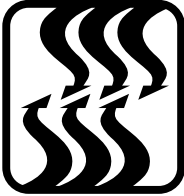


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DISCOVERING OUR PAST

The Armdale Girls' Chorus

Halifax music lovers enjoyed the performances of the Armdale Chorus on radio, television and live concerts for almost four decades. Starting as a Rhythm Band in 1934 under the direction of Mary Dee (later Mary Dee Girroir), the Armdale Glee Club was formed in 1937 from members of the Rhythm Band. This very young choir won the Festival Shield in the 1940 Provincial Music Festival. The group of girls, many of whom joined at the ages of eight, nine and ten, remained with the chorus throughout their adult lives. Most were from the communities of Melville Cove, Kline Heights, Jollimore, and Spryfield. When the group was first formed, practice took place in Melvilla Hall, a small building behind St. John the Baptist Church

Mary Dee was the daughter of John Dee and Margaret Buchanan. The Dee family, with its roots in Ireland, had settled in Ferguson's Cove where Michael Dee and his son, Michael, Jr., appeared as stonecutters at Queen's Quarries during the mid 1800s. Mary Dee's father, John, was the son of Michael Dee, Jr. and Anne Hilchie. As a young girl in the 1920s and early 1930s, Mary Dee spent her summers in Ferguson's Cove and taught piano and singing to the local children.

Following her graduation in music from Mount St. Vincent College, Miss Dee studied voice and choral conducting at the Juilliard School of Music in New York. She founded the Girroir School of Music and, as director of the Armdale Chorus, she and her group of talented young ladies achieved national and international prominence through their weekly performances on CBC Radio, reaching listeners from across Canada, in South America and in Europe. Their theme song “Out of a Dream” became well known to audiences around the world. Their music consisted of a variety of classical, romantic, religious, spiritual, and modern songs.

Annual choral concerts were given at the Nova Scotian Hotel. At Christmas they performed favourite songs for the veterans at Camp Hill Hospital. During the war years they sang for the services. In 1946 the chorus performed on an illuminated floating stage on Lake Banook for Dartmouth Natal Day, and on several occasions travelled throughout the province to perform at local festivals such as the Apple Blossom Festival, and to Tatamagouche

for the Festival of the Arts. They were featured in a short film by the National Film Board of Canada in 1953, and made two recordings with London Records of Canada. On one occasion, they toured the country with the Leslie Bell Singers.

The chorus continued to perform into the 1970s, making regular television appearances. Over the years, many of Mrs. Girroir's students obtained their music degrees, pursuing careers as teachers, church organists and supervisors of music in the schools. Among them were Terry Monaghan, Dolores Ward, Joan (Howitt) MacDonnell, Donna (Daniels) Dodge, Marie Himmelman, Rose Sullivan, Norma Marriott, Carol Whalen, Marjorie (Coady) Kimball and Carmel (Romo) Carrigan. A junior choir was formed during the 1950s from her many younger students. Peggy Mahon and Caroline Romo were two of the junior members.

During her lifetime, in addition to the Armdale Chorus, Mary Dee Girroir conducted the choir at St. John the Baptist Church in Armdale and the Mount Saint Vincent University Chorale. She was the organist for all Synagogue weddings in Halifax and head of the vocal department at the Maritime Academy of Music.

Mary Dee Girroir died on 19 May 1981 leaving behind a musical legacy that would never be forgotten by her students or the appreciative audiences with whom she

shared her many talents. She was survived by her husband, E. L. Giroir, a daughter Anne-Marie (Mrs. Peter Driscoll) and four grandchildren.

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Williams Lake Dam – Special Forces

At any given moment on the busy construction site of the new Williams Lake dam, there are several highly specialized teams of skilled workers synchronizing their efforts to safely build their important piece of this key infrastructure.

They include Project Managers overseeing the entire project from budgets to regulatory compliance; surveyors checking measurements for land topography; civil, mechanical and structural engineers monitoring project progress; heavy haulers and dump-trucks moving through the site; and dewatering technicians checking the pumping equipment to keep the site safe and dry for the crews. Together, these specialized teams are synchronizing efforts to build the new Williams Lake dam.

Lots of action is happening on the spillway. The skilled rebar ironworkers are assembling a massive mesh grid of reinforced steel bars inside the concrete form of the spillway. This team cuts, shapes, and ties steel bars together following structural drawings

and blueprints which specify not only the type of rebar to use but also the exact placement and specific spacing. This reinforced steel mesh form inside the spillway will prevent the structure from shifting or cracking, and provide the internal force needed to withstand any extreme water pressure the lake can throw at it.

An android-humanoid looking robot, called a drill rig, is in action. Because Nova Scotia has a shallow stony and rocky soil base, the insertion of construction grade grout will fill in the many spaces, cracks, and fissures that water can move through at the dam site. The grout forms a barrier to prevent lake water from seeping under or around the new dam and spillway. The drill rig is operated by a trained technician using what looks like a “play station controller.” The rig drills the hole and then injects the grout. Motor speed, hydraulic pressure, grout flow and direction are all determined by technicians. They also see to the pre-operation inspection, set up and mixing, monitoring and maintaining the even flow of grout,

and the clean up and maintenance of their equipment.

All these special forces - natural, mechanical, human – must be in sync for this dam to be built safely to exacting environmental standards and regulations. Build Nova Scotia

is overseeing the project with Dexter Construction Company’s teams of specialists. They are all aiming for the end of this year to complete the construction - just in time for a busy winter recreational season on Williams Lake.

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Birds of the Backlands – Atlantic Flyway - Fall Migration

Birds know stuff - like when it's time to migrate. Their internal calendar sends them a notification to alert them to changes in daylight, weather conditions and food supplies. When they notice depleted summer feeding areas and colder temperatures, they get fidgety. As the number of hours of daylight shifts, so do their hormones and they channel their restless energy into bulking up for their annual autumn migration.

The Halifax Backlands in Spryfield is an important habitat in a very active migration corridor for birds flying south from August through December. This wild and rugged 1,350 hectares offers feathered travellers all they need: a premium maritime route; access to safe resting barrens; pristine lakes as pre-flight departure areas; and bonus all-you-eat buffets in the many stands of forests, abundant wetlands, and rare Jack Pine and Crow Berry communities. No elite status required. All avian travellers are welcomed to this full-service flight lounge in the Halifax Backlands.

Described as a “mosaic of habitats” this urban wilderness hosts a unique variety of songbirds, raptors, species-at-risk, and many marine birds who rely on the flyway zone for their migratory journey. Warblers, thrushes, sparrows, and flycatchers use the old forest cover for safety and feeding. Raptor families of Merlins, Peregrine Falcons, Bald Eagles, Ospreys, Broad Wing hawks, owls, and the species-at-risk Common Nighthawk have been seen over the rugged barrens during this busy travel season.

In late autumn, birds gather on the many lakes and ponds in the Halifax Backlands and its watershed to prepare for their flight. A gaggle of geese, flocks of mergansers and families of loons often gather on Williams Lake, one of seven lakes in the Backlands watershed. They will feed frantically to fatten up while waiting for the right weather pattern. They will then synchronize their departure for these long-haul trips. Birds use familiar landmarks, the

sun, stars, and the earth's magnetic fields to guide them. Many birds fly at night and use the moon and the stars as navigation points. You can help them by turning off unnecessary outdoor lights during the fall and spring migrations so that birds stay on course to their southern climates.

There are several active bird conservation and advocacy groups in Spryfield - the Backlands Coalition, the Williams Lake Conservation Company (WLCC), McIntosh Run Watershed Association, and Urban Farm Museum Society of Spryfield. Fuelled by volunteers and supported by citizen scientists, these groups host birdwatching walks with local experts, document seasonal migrations, and contribute local data to international iBird and iNaturalists sites.

WLCC's Bird Team conducts yearly surveys – Owl Prowl, American Woodcock Survey, Hawk Watches, and General Bird Surveys in seven different locations in the Halifax Backlands from May to August. Data collected over the years indicates changes and trends in bird populations and their habitats. Data drives the decisions for protection and conservation of our wilderness areas!

Avid birder Joshua Barss Donham, of

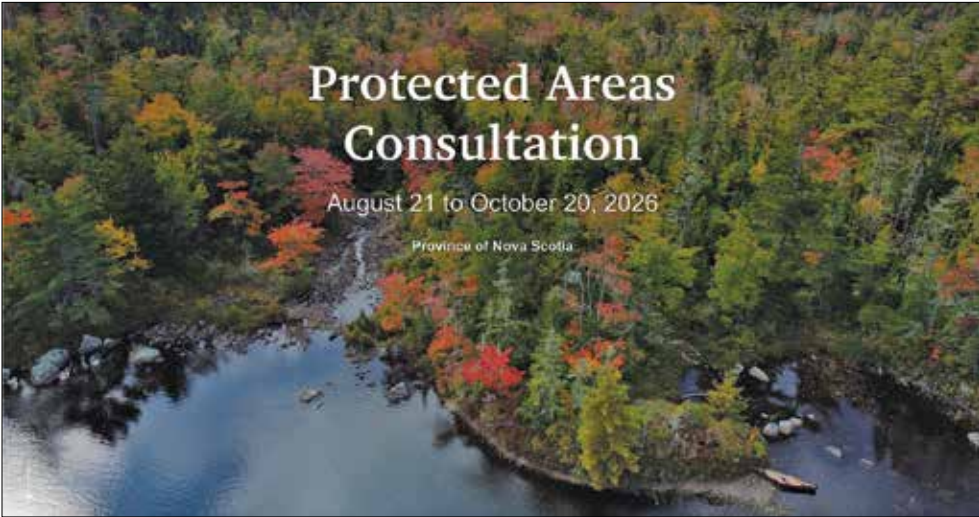
the Backlands Coalition and Williams Lake Conservation Company, states that, “Many bird species pass over and through Halifax on migration. Nova Scotia is on the path of a migratory corridor, part of the greater Atlantic Flyway, one of the four flyways - major migration flight paths - in North America. Of the four, the Atlantic Flyway is the most densely populated and the most affected by human development. Birds have come to expect and rely on the Halifax Backlands, with its variety of habitats, as a place to drop in, feed, and rest. We have to protect it.”

Birders, conservationists, and nature enthusiasts are closely following

the Nova Scotia government's recent addition of an extra 2,910-hectares of the Halifax Backlands territory between Spryfield and Sambro to the proposed “Herring Cove Backlands Wilderness” area!! Nova Scotia Department of Environment and Climate Change has re-opened their website for your input on protected areas in Nova Scotia. Protect Herring Cove Backlands Wilderness – You have a say!

Birders, conservationists, and nature enthusiasts are closely following the Nova Scotia government's recent addition of an extra 2,910-hectares of the Halifax Backlands to the proposed “Herring Cove Backlands Wilderness” area!! Nova Scotia Department of Environment and Climate Change has re-opened their website until October 20, 2026, for your feedback, and aspirations on protecting this huge urban wilderness. You can make this happen! You have a say!

The department is seeking your input on 11 sites proposed for protection as “wilderness areas or nature reserves.” They have set a goal to protect at least 20% of Nova Scotia's land and water by 2030. Their interim target is 15% by December 2026.

The “Herring Cove Backlands Wilderness” area is located between Spryfield and Sambro and is one of 11 parcels of wild habitats proposed for protection. 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What’s Happening at the Urban Farm?

As the summer months marched onward, we had lots of interesting days.

We are excited to announce that we are part of a program that is collecting data on bugs. It is through the Discovery Centre and we are a Bug Quest host with a bug collecting tent onsite. We will get a report in the latter part of 2027 and will let you know the details when the time arrives.

We have a couple of new garden bugs, one being the Japanese Beetle. We managed to catch a lot of them by putting a container of soapy water under leaves and knocking the bugs into the water. They have really taken a liking to string bean plants. And like most local gardens we have spider mites and flea beetles. We see deer every day and the numbers seem to be increasing, which is good news.

Our Scarlet Runner plants attract hummingbirds. We never tire of watching such quick little birds dart about our garden. And of course, the usual squirrel activity with lots of running about on the top of our 6-foot-high fencing. They are quite busy these days hiding acorns.

We had a wedding at our Urban Farm this year. It was quite lovely, with a young couple anxious to tie the knot. We hung around to make sure everything went smoothly. Their ceremony was really nice and nice weather came through for them. It all went smoothly, so we think we will have more weddings at the Urban Farm.

Very recently we found a large mushroom growing. It was the size of a dinner plate. Someone familiar with mushrooms stopped by to have a look and told us that it is called “the blusher”, because it

turns red or pink when it is damaged or bruised. Its name – Amanita.

We also found small, slender ones growing on wood chips. They were more silver grey and quite slender, about 3

inches high. They looked like a small army as they were guarding the surrounding area.

We also have lots of apples this year. Some are tasty to munch on while others

are great for making applesauce. And as usual, we weed, weed, and weed. Anyone out there have any good, true and tried ways to keep weeds down to a minimum? The Urban Farm wishes our readers a pleasant fall season.

Baby Turtles rescued by Williams Lake Conservation Company volunteers

The Williams Lake Conservation Company (WLCC) take their role as “Care-takers” of the lake seriously. It took WLCC volunteers and local neighbours over 3 hours in the dark to rescue 59 baby snapping turtles in mid-September. The tiny dinosaur-looking turtles

emerged from their gravelly nest close to the lake shoreline where they were safely moved and successfully introduced to their new home in Williams Lake. “This was a very exciting hatch!” said Melanie Dobson, member of WLCC board of directors. “We have been monitoring and trying to protect the various

nests in the area that were dug in the spring. We were hoping for a successful fall hatch as there are many challenges for these little ones – raccoons, dogs, cars, people – all reducing their survival chances. These snapping turtles are listed as ‘vulnerable’ on Nova Scotia’s endangered species list, so we were fascinated watching them hatch and eager to move them safely into Williams Lake.” In the spring, female turtles leave Williams Lake to find soft gravel to dig their nests and lay between 20 to 100 eggs. Left undisturbed, the eggs will incubate in the warm ground over the summer for about 50 to 125 days. Hatchlings will usually emerge from their nests in the mild weather in the fall. Many of the nests are destroyed by raccoons, foxes, birds, dogs and human activity. Only a low percentage of the hatchlings will actually survive to reproductive age, so moving them into the safety of Williams Lake was a critical step in WLCC’s rescue efforts. Building our Budget Together

Imagine going to your doctor for a routine checkup. After reviewing your tests, your doctor sits down and says, “I’d like to talk about your health.”

That’s what happened with the Provincial budget for 2026-27.

Nobody looks forward to that conversation, but a diagnosis doesn’t create the condition; it reveals it. It tells you honestly where you are and what you are facing. Only then can the doctor write the prescription.

Nova Scotia is at a similar moment. Our diagnosis is clear. Demand for healthcare continues to grow; our roads, schools and hospitals are aging; the cost of delivering public services keeps rising and we are running significant

deficits. Some say, “Just run a billion-dollar deficit.” If only it was that easy. As a government, we don’t have the luxury of pretending that reality doesn’t exist. That treatment requires more revenue. That’s why we are pursuing opportunities in defence, mining and critical minerals and energy to create good-paying jobs across our province and bring in the revenue needed to invest in healthcare, housing and roads without raising taxes. As our government manages our financial challenges, families are navigating affordability pressures, uncertainty created by President Trump’s tariffs, and the reality of serious housing and cost-of-living challenges.

These pressures are converging in a way that is reshaping how we must plan, invest and make decisions.

The decisions we make now will shape the Province for the next generation. That’s why we are building the next budget together.

Starting September 21, we will be hosting budget consultations that offer Nova Scotians the opportunity to have their voices heard. Dates and locations of the meetings are at: <https://yourbudget.novascotia.ca/engagement-sessions>

and Treasury Board, Attention: Budget Engagement, P.O. Box 187, Halifax, N.S., B3J 2N3. We want Nova Scotians to understand the numbers, choices and trade-offs. They can attend a session, send an email or use an online budget tool to tell us what matters most to them. After the consultation we will share a report that will show the main themes, which will help guide the 2027-28 budget. Nova Scotians know by managing their own budgets that rising costs are

making choices more difficult. I have faith that people who participate in this consultation will also understand that government must make difficult decisions and trade-offs as well. The Nova Scotians I met with this summer were clear with me that we need to protect our future by building Nova Scotia. Managing our budget is a big part of that and I invite you to have your say. The Maguire Report

I’m very excited to share some important news for our community: Nova Scotia’s first Menopause Centre of Excellence is coming to Spryfield. Expected to open in the winter of 2026-27, the new centre will bring together evidence-based menopause care, education, and research, with the goal of improving access to high-quality care and support for women during mid-life. Having this centre located here in Spryfield is something our community can be proud of. It will provide an important new healthcare service while also helping improve how menopause is understood and treated across Nova Scotia. For too long, menopause and other areas of women’s health have not received the attention they deserve. The Menopause Centre of Excellence represents an important change in that direction.

The centre is part of a broader provincial focus on women’s health. The Province is also taking action to increase access to breast screening and reduce wait times, creating a new Women’s Health Research and Innovation Grant, and establishing an education coordinator to improve understanding of menopause among healthcare providers, educators, and the public.

This fall, Nova Scotia will also hold its first Women’s Health Summit, bringing together patients, healthcare providers, community organizations, advocates and other stakeholders to help identify priorities and shape the future of women’s healthcare.

A new provincial Women’s Health Clinical Collaborative and a dedicated Women’s Health Program within the Department of Health and Wellness will provide greater leadership and co-ordination across the healthcare system.

September was an exciting month for Herring Cove as the Herring Cove Community Centre officially celebrated its grand opening. Community members came together on September 20 for an afternoon of food, music and celebration at the new facility on Latter Pond Lane.

This beautiful new centre is a wonderful addition to Herring Cove and will provide a space for neighbours, families, and community organizations to come together for years to come. Congratulations and thank you to everyone whose hard work, dedication and support helped turn this community vision into a reality.

Work continued throughout September on the Williams Lake Dam replacement project. Crews worked on the bedrock and foundation in preparation for construction of the new dam structure. The new dam will follow the footprint of the original structure, which

dates back to the 1700s, and is being built to meet or exceed Canadian Dam Association standards. The Province of Nova Scotia, through Build Nova Scotia, is investing \$4.965 million to replace the aging dam. This important investment will help protect nearby residents and properties while safeguarding Williams Lake and its ecosystem for generations to come. I was pleased that an agreement was reached in September to continue the School and Youth Transit Pass Program for the 2026–27 school year after discussions between the Province, HRCE and HRM. Under the agreement, HRCE is funding transit passes for students attending five Halifax-area schools where public transit is more practical than traditional school transportation. The Province is continuing to fund passes for Halifax youth ages 13 to 18 connected to Employment Support and Income Assistance, while HRM is funding passes for the remaining students in Grades 7 through 12, including homeschooled students and those attending private schools. It took some discussion to get there, but I was glad everyone stayed at the table and found a way forward. Most importantly, young people continue to have access to transit for school, work, sports, after-school activities and other opportunities. September brought another encouraging update on access to primary care in Nova Scotia. As of September 1, the Need a Family Practice Registry had fallen to 52,771 Nova Scotians, down from 54,582 on August 1 — a decrease of 1,811 people in just one month. The registry had also fallen to less than 5% of Nova Scotia’s population. While there is still more work to do, the continued decline is an important sign of progress as we work to connect more Nova Scotians with family doctors and nurse practitioners. Anyone who still needs a primary-care provider should make sure their information on the Need a Family Practice Registry is current, either online or by calling 811. Fall has arrived, bringing cooler temperatures, colourful leaves and a change of pace across our community. The days are getting shorter and the evenings a little colder, but it is still a great time to get outside and enjoy our local trails, parks, and neighbourhoods. Students have settled back into their school routines, fall activities are underway, and our community continues to be as busy as ever. As we move further into the season, I hope everyone has an opportunity to enjoy the crisp autumn air, spend some time with family and friends, and appreciate the beautiful place we get to call home.
